



CHARACTERS

General George McClure 1771-1851

General George McClure was born in Londonderry, Ireland. He emigrated to America in 1793, settling in Steuben County, New York. By 1795 his military career was taking shape. He was a militia commander and was appointed Brigadier General, a position he held until the close of the War of 1812.

He came west at the age of 64 to build again in fresh, new country. He opened the first post office in the Elgin-Dundee area on a tract of land on the west



side of Rt. 25, near the Milk Pail restaurant. He was also a member of the Board of Trustees for Elgin Academy.

He died in 1851 was interred in the Old Cemetery on Channing St. His remains were moved to Bluff City in the early 1900s to make way for a school expansion.

Ruth Ann Kimball 1821-1908

Ruth Ann Kimball came to Elgin in 1837 with her mother Nancy and her brother William. She spent the first 14 years of her life in New Hampshire, where she received her formal education.



In 1840 she married Edward Harvey, an attorney and a captain with the Mexican American War. They had 2 daughters, Isabel and Florence. Sadly her husband died from a fever while returning home from battle.

In 1851, she married Chauncy Thiers. They had 2 sons, Henry and William. A citizen of Elgin for 61 years, she had witnessed many important changes in the county.

She lived at 302 W. Chicago St in a cobblestone house that was built in 1846. The house was built by the Kimball brothers and presented to her mother, Nancy Kimball, widow of Joseph. At the time of her death in 1908, she was considered to be living in Elgin longer than anyone else at the time.

Peter Burritt 1816-1892

Peter Burritt was a wealthy dairy farmer from Hanover Township. When the value of Elgin real estate began to rise, he invested heavily and owned 90 pieces of property in Elgin.

His first wife, Henrietta died in the 1880s. Four years later he married a much younger woman, Rebecca McBride. Mr. Burritt died in 1892 and Rebecca married William Gilbert, a well known book store owner.

In 1908, two buildings were constructed in downtown Elgin to honor her late husband.

Dr. Joseph Tefft 1812-1888

Dr. Tefft was Elgin's first doctor, who practiced here for 40 years. He was the primary force in getting Elgin incorporated as a city in 1854. He was also the first mayor of Elgin, serving for 5 terms. He was also an election judge and served 2 terms as a police magistrate and township supervisor.

Teft was nominated as the first president of the Elgin Board of Trade and the Elgin Dairy Club. Dr. Tefft served as president of Elgin Academy Board for 33 years, and is credited with getting the school



built. He was very involved in the community and was a strong advocate for social issues of the day.

CHARACTERS

Paul Kemler 1837-1915

Paul Kemler Sr. was born in Germany and moved to Chicago in 1856. He worked for a tanner. By 1861 he responded to President Lincoln's first call for troops and served in the 24th Illinois Volunteer Infantry, under General Grant.

After the war, he became a patrolman on the Chicago police force and served for 4 years. He moved to Elgin in 1872 and ran the Washington Hotel for 17 years.

Mr. Kemler had everything from an Odd Fellow lodge named after him to serving as a city alderman in Elgin marking his legacy.



Elgin Typhoid Epidemic of 1916

July, 1916 was the hottest month on record for the City of Elgin. The lack of rain combined with 90 degree temperatures made for a very uncomfortable summer.

To make matters worse, there was an unusual prevalence of intestinal symptoms among the employees of the watch factory.


The source of the contamination was traced to a leaky valve which separated water from the factory

reservoir on Watch St. and water taken from the river. The two sources of water became mixed in an uncovered catch basin under the floor of the blacksmith shop.

In total, 26 people died and many others endured a long recovery.

The Watch Factory paid claims of \$40,000 to the families of the deceased.

Located at 360 Park Street, the museum is housed in "Old Main", the original building of the Elgin Academy. The three story Greek Revival was designed by J. Quigley and was completed in 1856. Staff and boarding students lived in the building, which was heated by stoves connected to four chimneys. Classrooms were upstairs. In 1911 it was struck by lightning and the roof and cupola burned. The building was abandoned in the 1960s and was later sold to the City for \$1.00. After another fire the exterior was restored to its original appearance in 1980. The Elgin Area Historical Society leased the building from the City, restored the first floor and opened as a museum in 1987.
